ORGANISATION	DESCRIPTION OF PROJECT	GRANT AWARDED
Abuse Prevention Services Inc	Abuse Prevention Services helps prevent family violence in the Hibiscus Coast/Rodney area by promoting nonviolent attitudes and behaviours in men, women, youth and children within the context of their community. They do this by providing specialised services to clients and working collaboratively with others on family violence projects and promotions. Many of the clients are on low incomes and may be experiencing other social problems. Approved funding will contribute towards the cost of facilitator fees and expenses for two programmes for up to 26 women victims of abuse in the Rodney and Hibiscus areas. These programmes are educational, strengths-based domestic violence programmes, 30 hours in length, delivered over 12 weeks.	\$10,564.00
Adult Literacy Tamaki Auckland Inc	Adult Literacy Tamaki Auckland (ALTA) is a well-established professional organisation focused on improving the literacy and numeracy of the adult population of Auckland City. They provide courses in writing, reading, maths, Pasifika communication skills, financial literacy, whanau literacy, employment skills and basic computer skills plus individual and workplace tuition. ALTA is an active participant in the Tamaki Financial Wellbeing project. Funding has been provided for costs associated with running a Financial Literacy programme focused on Glen Innes, Pt England and Panmure community. This class will run for 18 weeks.	\$2,155.00
Adventure Specialties Trust	Adventure Specialties Trust uses outdoor adventure to grow great communities through the holistic development of individuals, families and communities. Funding will enable the purchase of additional specialised camping/activity equipment which will be used for strengthening family programmes. The Trust works collaboratively with social agencies and programmes are targeted towards families that are under stress and require additional support. Examples include parent and child facilitated camps, family camps and mother support activities. The Trust also provides youth development programmes where it works with other groups to provide multi-day expeditions and facilitated adventure activities. It is estimated that this equipment will benefit 3,000 people per annum.	\$9,420.36
Age Concern Auckland Inc	Age Concern is dedicated solely to older New Zealanders. It promotes dignity and respect for all older people as well as providing expert information and support services in response to older people's needs. Research has shown that of the 65,658 older persons in the Auckland area, 7,800 suffer from some level of financial hardship and 3,900 live below the poverty line. A perceived need for financial management support is often the precursor for broader engagement with financial issues often symptomatic of wider issues of abuse, neglect or isolation. Funding will support a Financial Management programme to improve the lifestyle and wellbeing of older people, with a focus on helping them to better manage their financial resources when they no longer feel able to do it themselves. The clients who will benefit are 60 years plus, have limited cash assets by reason of age-related incapacity, who unable to handle their own financial affairs with no friends or appropriate family members to assist them. The service will provide a personalised, day-to-day banking management service, liaison with creditors and budgeting services to negotiate payment terms, arrangements for funerals and funeral grants, liaison with rest homes, hospitals and relatives, deliver pensions where appropriate, and buying essential items. In cases where ongoing financial management is needed, provision of the service will be maintained until a person is o longer able to make informed decisions (and passes into statutory care) or they pass away.	\$20,000.00

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Arise and Shine Community Development Trust	The Arise and Shine Community Development Trust empowers Tongan family groups so that they can better support their children's learning and raise their achievements as a pathway to future prosperity. This is a strategic response to address the problem of Pacific children's educational under achievement. The Trust's planned activities for integrating Educational and Practical skills for Tongan students include opening two Homework Centres at Mt Roskill Grammar School to tutor and mentor students in all subject areas, opening a Family Corner as a parallel programme for parents, and organising educational family workshops and presentations to cover financial literacy, health issues and family violence. There will be an invitation to an open family evening with inspirational speakers on Pacific role models. Funding supports the employment of 15 tutors and an administrator, plus pays for accounting services, workshop expenses and computer equipment and stationery.	\$5,600.00
Auckland City Mission	Auckland City Mission helps people in desperate need by providing excellent integrated services and effective advocacy. Over the last year, the Mission has been changing the way it operates food bank services to better serve the needs of Aucklanders suffering from food inequality, that is, lack of access to adequate, nutritious food. It has closed the South Auckland stand-alone food bank at Otahuhu and has partnered with Manukau Urban Maori Authority and Papakura Marae to open two new satellite food banks. The move to a collaborative model has proved successful with 2,504 food parcels being distributed through their satellites. The Mission is now moving in to stage 2 of the satellite food bank programme and adding additional satellites in areas identified as having a high percentage of their clients. It has partnered with Te Whare Awhina O Tamworth to provide support, training and food parcels to Clendon Park Community House. Funding has been approved to contribute towards the 'Mission in Partnership Satellite Food Project' salary for the Crisis Care and Community Services Team Leader.	\$25,000.00
Auckland Philarmonia Ochestra - Sistema Aotearoa	Sistema Aotearoa is a programme in Otara that uses the group teaching of orchestral music-making to foster confidence, teamwork and aspiration in young children, helping to promote these values within families and the community. There are 240 children from 6 to 12 years old who attend one of the seven decile 1 primary schools within walking distance, learn from specialist musicians and educators after school and in the school holidays. Tuition and instruments are provided free of charge. Participation is open to all children, regardless of ability and each child receives over four hours of group tuition per week. Sistema Aotearoa helps children to grow up to be well-adjusted and happy adults through the use of positive behavioural modelling in a stimulating, supportive and well-managed learning environment where each child can thrive. A paediatric developmental therapist ensures best teaching practices are used. Children remain with Sistema Aotearoa until they leave school with participation being found to improve attendance and behaviour at school. The success of Sistema worldwide and Sistema Aotearoa in particular has encouraged other communities in New Zealand to establish similar programmes. Funding will contribute towards the additional cost of a new intake of 90 students in 2015 including tutors, venue rental, and resources such as music stands and workbooks.	\$10,000.00
Auckland Regional Migrant Services Charitable Trust	The Auckland Regional Migrant Services Charitable Trust (ARMS) facilitates the successful settlement of newcomers, economic empowerment of communities, and intercultural respect. The WISE Collective Project is one of four partnership projects being run under a well established partnership between the ARMS Trust and the ARCC. Both the WISE Collective and the NZ Ethnic Women's Trust are working with women from former refugee and recent migrant backgrounds living in lower socioeconomic areas of Auckland to utilise their ethnic catering skills and interests. Women from both projects are currently engaged in either market food stalls or the provision of catering and have gained the appropriate licenses. Some of the more proficient women are now ready and interested to move to a more business level of catering by setting up an authentic ethnic cafe, as a social enterprise, providing lunches and dinners for 3–5 days a week. This project would be set up in Mt Roskill, and hopes to engage 30 women throughout the week. Funding to support this initiative has been approved for a Project Coordinator responsible for the development, planning, training, resourcing, reporting, evaluation and accountability aspects of the project, and Project Workers who will be hands-on, leading the catering teams on different days. Funding will also support personnel costs such as Kiwisaver and ACC, training, rental and administration and overhead costs.	\$29,950.00

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Barnardos New Zealand	The services of Barnardos New Zealand focus on improving outcomes for vulnerable children, building stronger communities and creating the potential for brighter futures. The Te Korowai Mokopuna project (TKM) is an innovative new mode for the delivery of social services to marginalised and at-risk families and children. TKM is a social service resource hub attached to Barnardos Early Learning Centres in the most vulnerable communities in South Auckland. TKM provides wraparound support, outreach, education and training in a way that is responsive to vulnerable children and family in need. During the next year, TKM will move into the next phase of development with the strategic partnership with Save the Children New Zealand, complementing existing collaboration with a number of other organisations such as well child providers, antenatal and other health services, local marae and schools. This partnership will further strengthen the community development methodologies and strong community partnerships at the heart of TKM. Combining the experience and skills in community based development programmes of Save the Children with Barnardos' own expertise in children's welfare, advocacy and social services, this is a powerful new force working to improve the lives of children and young people across New Zealand. The project has the target of working with 300 families across a wide range of interventions including addressing social and health issues, improving parenting skills and associated outcomes for children, progression towards learning and employment opportunities for parents, improvements in school performance for children and increases in community cohesion and the promotion of social capital. Funding will pay for a Whanau Worker and an external project evaluation which will enable the effective rolling out of the TKM model to other communities.	\$55,458.00
Beneficiaries Advocacy and Information Service	Beneficiaries Advocacy and Information Services provides free independent, professional information and advocacy services to beneficiaries and low-income families on their financial entitlements through WINZ and IRD. They assist clients to address their financial issues and provide a connected pathway to wider community support to empower people to improve their long term family well-being. Currently, they assist over 3,000 people a year through phone enquiries and see another 400-600 clients on an individual client basis. Their advocates work collaboratively with over 40 local community agencies on client cross-referrals. Funding has been approved to assist with salaries of advocates.	\$40,000.00
Big Brothers, Big Sisters of Auckland	Big Brothers Big Sisters of Auckland (BBBS) recruits, trains and monitors one-to-one volunteer mentors to engage with vulnerable young people between the ages of 7-18. BBBS is committed to positive youth development by providing positive relationships to develop personal strengths and enhance long-term success. Those children that could most benefit are prioritised including children being raised by a single parent, parents who are incarcerated, youth in foster care or youth with other risk factors that impact their path toward attaining higher educational success and life success. Funding will support the match in volunteer mentors who will work with 20 young people and their families.	\$7,500.00
Big Buddy Mentoring Trust	Big Buddy Mentoring Trust recruits volunteer men as long-term mentors for fatherless boys to guide them towards education, employment and constructive futures, providing support to the solo caregiver on a low income. Funding will extend their current capability by implementing a new collaborative change model of working with community groups of all ethnicities throughout New Zealand. The organisation has worked extensively towards this new model and now needs to employ a contract Development Manager to develop a business plan with supporting documentation in readiness for the implementation of this plan. This model will mean they do not need to open costly new Big Buddy centres and waste resources managing them at a distance. Embedding this programme into existing services will mean many more mentors for fatherless boys. Whangarei is their key target area for further development and funding will support costs including a 5-month contract for a Development Manager, evaluation of first six months of the programme, database modification to enable sharing with other organisations and travel costs.	\$27,800.00
Brainwave Trust Aotearoa	Brainwave's vision is that one day every child in New Zealand will get the best start in life because parents, professionals and the whole community have the confidence to nurture and value every child. They build knowledge and understanding of the importance of brain development and the role that nurture plays in this, and the impact this has on every child's physical, social, intellectual and emotional development. Brainwave is unique in that its programmes are based on the latest available scientific research; it is the only organisation which provides this information without bias. This is achieved by collating the latest findings from neuroscience, psychology and other disciplines on early and adolescent brain development into easy to understand, informative educational programmes. Funding will pay the salary of a National Coach who will lead and develop the Educator team so that they present and disseminate their key messages effectively to a range of audiences (prospective parents, parents, professionals, school children and prisoners) in a knowledgeable and interactive way through both workshops and seminars. There are 34 coaches nationally with 13 of these based in Auckland/Northland.	\$4,000.00

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CAPS Northland Inc t/a Jigsaw North	Jigsaw North support and assist vulnerable children and families through counselling, family support and parenting education programmes to improve parenting skills, children's coping and family safety and wellbeing. Clients are disadvantaged, vulnerable families who are often struggling with other issues including financial burdens, custody issues, family violence and poor wellbeing. The intention is to reach 45 clients through the generic programmes and a further 40 with the Parent Coach. Funding will support parenting education in the wider Whangarei area plus associated costs of the programme. This includes four generic parenting programmes over the next 12 months and funding a Parent Coach role to reinforce this learning for parents and support to families.	\$10,000.00
Care Waitakere Trust	CARE Waitakere Trust provides high quality compassionate, affordable and professional services which enhance the wellbeing of families in Te Atatu and the wider Waitakere community. These services include free budgeting, advocacy, social work and family support as well as affordable counselling and free group work for children and adults. Vulnerable and at-risk families will be identified and provided with early interventions before serious crisis necessitates referral to CYFS or Mental Health Services. Based on their current client statistics, these people will be from a multi-ethnic, low economic, chaotic background and referred from a number of different agencies. The need for a Social Worker is one of the gaps that has been evident for a number of years but unable to be filled due to a lack of funding. Therefore funding will pay for a qualified social worker for 24 hours a week to provide advice, advocacy and support to individuals and families with personal and social problems.	\$10,000.00
Christians Against Poverty	Christian Against Poverty's (CAP) purpose is to release New Zealanders from a life sentence of debt, poverty and its causes through three free programmes run in partnership with local churches nationwide: 1) Debt Help – freeing families in poverty because of unmanageable debt; 2) CAP Money – financial literacy training; and 3) CAP Job clubs – employment help programme. Funding will resource their Debt Help service for the Caseworker Team Leader and six Client Services Caseworkers who set up and work long-term with families to free them from poverty and unmanageable debt. These caseworkers negotiate with clients' creditors to work out a fair repayment plan, create a liveable budget, and provide financial literacy and support for them to stick to their financial goals. Factors contributing to families needing this service is easy access to credit and hire purchase, poor financial literacy, penalty interest rate changes, low incomes, unemployment and redundancy. In Greater Auckland during 2015, this programme will reach 680 new families and support an existing 512 clients. Of these 67% are single parents and 59% are beneficiaries. Currently, there is a 2–3 month wait to become a CAP client, 60% of CAP clients have tried and failed at becoming debt-free using other budgeting agencies.	\$20,000.00
Citizens Advice Bureau Dargaville & Districts Inc	The purpose of Citizens Advice Bureau Dargaville & Districts is to ensure that individuals do not suffer through ignorance of their rights and responsibilities. The service provides information and advice on family matters, community, education, health, legal, housing and consumer problems. It is also the agency for the Foodbank and has a Community Law Clinic. It provides a weekly budgeting clinic and refers clients to two local budgeting organisations, advises clients on courses they can do to upgrade their skills, and provides access to trained counsellors. They have 1,200 enquiries annually. Funding will contribute towards the coordinators' annual salary.	\$5,000.00
Community Budget Service, Kerikeri	Community Budget Service Kerikeri provides budget advice and advocacy for people in need from Taupo Bay to Waitangi. Their client numbers have increased from 125 in 2012 to current numbers of 620. 90% of clients in Kerikeri are Maori and many are referred from WINZ and other agencies. The Whaingaroa particularly is a low decile, low economic area where education is poor, there is a lack of employment, poor standard housing, and an overall a lack of hope for the future. The Community Budget Service provides budget advice and counselling, education programmes to raise financial capability and a total money management system. The new funding will support the ongoing wages for the lead adviser and office rental to run the service one day a week in Kaeo.	\$39,390.00
Community Education Trust Auckland (COMET Auckland)	COMET Auckland's mission is advancing education for Auckland, focusing on areas of greatest need. COMET Auckland have received funding on behalf of Te Waipuna Puawai (Tamaki) and Te Awa Ora Trust (Randwick Park, Manurewa) for these communities to continue their community-led approach to create better futures for local whanau through greater financial wellbeing. Both communities intend to use strategies to build family financial awareness and wellbeing that are fit for purpose for each community. This continues to build on the pilot project funded by the Trust the past two years. COMET Auckland is providing project sponsorship and leadership. COMET will link learnings from both communities to identify possibilities to replicate or scale up in other communities. Funding has been made for a three-year commitment that recognises that building local capacity to sustain changing beliefs and financial behaviours takes time. The first year completed scoping and planning, last year focussed on trialling approaches, delivery, evaluating and modifying approaches, and this final year will incorporate a final evaluation process, with the development of models of approach for potential scaling and/or adoption in other communities.	\$197,200.00

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Counselling Services Centre	Counselling Services Centre provides services to people affected by domestic violence, grief, depression and anxiety through to services - Crisis Response and Counselling. The organisation provides 24/7 crisis response for victims of sexual violence. Last year, support was given to approximately 1,800 people in the community. They work closely with the Counties Manukau Police, helping provide victims with independent, professional crisis response and support. Funding approved is for the annual salary of their Office Administrator who works closely with Police and the Crisis Team, linking the two together. This is an integral role for the organisation.	\$10,000.00
Crosspower New Zealand	Crosspower was founded in 1994 to address the causes and impacts of poverty for youth and families of Otara with primary objectives around employment initiatives. Funding will support the youth social entrepreneurship direction - Crosspower Innovation. This represents two roles within the organisation that will pilot and evaluate the Social Entrepreneurship approach - their Youth Mentor and the Operations and Impact Manager roles. Crosspower is also seeking support towards contracting the NZ Institute of Economic Research (NZIER) to produce the economic analysis that will inform the monitoring, evaluation and understanding of their impact and this funding has also been approved. Crosspower works with some of the most vulnerable young people and their families in Otara, with 90% being Pacific or Maori. The aim is to pipeline this population into entrepreneurial learning and experience - a skill inherent in Pacific Island ethnicities. This entrepreneurial hub will create economic development that breaks the intergenerational impacts of poverty in the community. The long term impact of this initiative has three outcomes: 1) the development of a generation of young people with the knowledge and skills of how to make money through meaningful and real programmes and environments; 2) to impact the youth unemployment rate and small business growth; and 3) to create innovative social businesses that generate revenue to be reinvested into the ongoing initiative.	\$34,500.00
De Paul House	De Paul House provides housing and family support services with the aim of keeping families united in a safe and dignified environment. Families are helped to address the issues that have led to them being homeless and after around six months they leave to successfully re-establish themselves in the community. The programmes run assist families along the path towards sustainable and independent living and include Money Matters - teaching budgeting and financial literacy, Computing - learning and developing computer skills, Employment Training - one-on-one CV preparation, interview practice and job search skills, Cafe Club - social service related speakers and a collaboration with English Language Partners to provide literacy skills, identified as a large barrier to employment. The funding will assist with the running of the Learning Centre including a Money Matters tutor, a computer tutor, a Learning Centre Evaluator/Coordinator, an Employment Training Tutor, English Language Partners and other Learning Centre associated costs.	\$40,400.00
Dress for Success Auckland	The purpose of Dress for Success Auckland is to empower women into employment with wraparound services that provide interview clothing, confidence training, career advice, and ongoing resources and support to find a job, win the job and keep the job. Its programme works with 300 referring organisation and sees 1,500 women from low socio-economic backgrounds each year. 76% of their clients are of Maori and Pacific Island backgrounds and a large percentage are single parents. Funding will support a contribution to overall operational expenses. A second tranche of funding will provide a contribution to Dress for Success to formally establish a similar service for Men based on collaboration with another service provider over the past few years, meeting the same need for men as for women.	\$20,000.00
East Auckland Home and Budget Service Charitable Trust	East Auckland Home and Budget Service Charitable Trust's purpose is to improve the quality of life for families and individuals who are in financial strife because of money management difficulties. They build trust and understanding with clients so they gain self-confidence and competence in their own ability to manage their personal and family finances responsibly. The service has been operating for the last 30 years and operates in a low socioeconomic area of Auckland (Panmure, Glen Innes, Pt England, Mt Wellington and adjoining areas. Their service impacts on 2,000 people per annum mostly with families and on low incomes. Beneficiaries make up 78% of the 268 new clients, and 66% are Maori and Pacific people. Professional leadership is the key to their success and also their greatest operational cost with their budget advisors at the core of what they do. Funding will support a salary contribution for the Manager and for one Budget Advisor.	\$19,000.00
Encounter Hope Foundation	Encounter Hope Foundation based in Avondale, has the mission of creating hope in the community through providing direction and resources which meet social, emotional, spiritual and educational needs. The Hope Centre is a social hub that fosters a feeling of acceptance and belonging in the community. It provides a space where anyone can drop in for a hot drink, a snack and a chat. Programmes can be accessed there to improve the wellbeing of individuals and families struggling with addictions, dysfunctional relationships, unemployment, poverty and a lack of life skills. Individuals and families can receive ongoing care, counselling, post-rehab support, life skills and coaching, training and practical assistance. Last year, they had 5,235 regulars and visitors. Funding will provide a contribution towards salaries and lease costs for the Centre for the next 12 months.	\$15,000.00

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English Language Partners New Zealand - Auckland Central Centre	English Language Partners New Zealand Auckland Central Centre teach English and provide settlement support to adult refugees and migrant living in New Zealand. The learners they work with want to communicate effectively so they can live independent daily lives and participate in live in New Zealand. The Auckland Central branch will be running four English for Work courses in 2015. Each course is 48 hours long (3 hours, twice a week) and is for permanent residents or people with Work Permits who are unemployed. The aim is for people to be able to write a CV and covering letter, to improve pronunciation, interview skills and communication in the workplace and to have an understanding of New Zealand workplace culture.	\$10,000.00
English Language Partners New Zealand - Auckland South	English Language Partners Auckland South assists migrants and refugees in South Auckland to learn English for effective settlement in New Zealand. The learners they work with want to communicate effectively so they can live independent daily lives and participate in live in New Zealand. Funding will support venue costs incurred in teaching English to refugees and migrants in the Manurewa and Mangere East communities. There are high levels of unemployment in these areas with high migrant populations because their English levels are so low. The classes also provide an important social need which gets learners out of their homes and gives them the opportunity to meet other people thus reducing some of the isolation they experience.	\$10,000.00
English Language Partners New Zealand - North Shore Centre	English Language Partners North Shore provides English language skills and social support for the effective resettlement of adult migrants and refugees on the North Shore. The learners they work with want to communicate effectively so they can live independent daily lives and participate living in New Zealand. They run a volunteer tutor training course which is NZQA approved (Certificate in ESOL Home Tutoring). Funding will provide a salary contribution support a Training & Resources Coordinator employed to recruit and interview new tutors, provide effective training and development and to retain a solid base of long-term volunteers. The training course covers the aspects of volunteer tutoring, cross-cultural awareness and intercultural communications, adults as language learners and approaches to language learning. The course is run four times a year and trains 80-90 new volunteer tutors. They currently have over 250 active volunteer tutors.	\$10,000.00
English Language Partners New Zealand - West Auckland Centre	English Language Partners New Zealand West Auckland teach English assists migrants and refugees in South Auckland to learn English for effective settlement. They have many needy learners and priority is given to low-level beginners and those that cannot afford access to other English provision. Funding has been approved to assist support venue costs of community-based English language classes for adult refugees and migrants in the West Auckland area. They use community venues across West Auckland for classes close to where participants live so they can access them by walking or catching public transport and so that the learners can connect with other services located in their local area.	\$10,000.00
Family Start Manukau	The aim of Manukau Family Start is to improve life outcomes for infants/children by enabling young families to overcome the barriers which prevent their children from enjoying a successful future. Over 90% are Maori/Pacific families on low incomes or beneficiaries and are living in poverty. Most of these high risk families are heavily burdened with debt and face multiple issues including housing and unemployment. Funding will contribute towards the salary of the Vulnerable Infants Coordinator, employed to improve the safety, health and wellbeing of 736 'atrisk' children, pre-birth to 6 years of age in Counties Manukau. This is a critical role to facilitate collaboration between Government and community agencies, where working closely with Whanau workers and external health and welfare agencies provides a conduit for the sharing of information and the collaborative resolution of family issues.	\$10,000.00
Far North Disabilities Resource Centre Inc	The purpose of the Far North Disabilities Resource Centre in Kaitaia is to provide each person who has a disability with the opportunity to choose a lifestyle which encourages integration in the community, enables maximum independence and gives choices similar to those available for non-disabled people. Funding will support running a computer school to provide clients/whanau with skills that will enable them to improve their circumstances in life by providing avenues for further training and ultimately employment. There are 30 students at a time who on a flexible learning schedule to allow for their health requirements. The content can vary and is designed to meet the requirements of each individual client. The focus is to provide clients with introductory computer skills, literacy and numeracy and various other aspects including budgeting, CV development, job search and associated employment skills. Funding will enable the school to expand from three days to five days by offsetting wages and other costs. Since inception, 60% of clients who participated have gone on to successfully complete mainstream training or some form of employment. Further funding has also been approved to address a shortfall in existing funding and to the expansion of the outdoor activities programme.	\$10,000.00

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First Foundation	First Foundation brings together a diverse group of people to assist academically talented and financially disadvantaged students to achieve their potential through tertiary education and prepare them to positively influence their communities. Supporting a 'first in family' student can break the cycle and create a positive ripple effect for their community. They have identified four pillars of support to bridge the opportunity divide for their students – education, experience, guidance and support, and it is these four pillars that their four-year programme is built around. 2014 was a milestone year, awarding a record number of scholarships and further developing their Foundation Steps programme. Funding this year is approved for salary contributions to continue this momentum by building capacity and enabling them to scale up. There are 236 participating students this year. The financial support from the scholarship makes tertiary education more accessible, while reducing the financial burden on families.	\$20,000.00
Glen Innes Family Centre	The Glen Innes Family Centre provides social work support and advocacy which promotes the protection, wellbeing and best management of children and young persons in safe families. Rainbow Youth Incorporated	Rainbow Youth provides support, education and advocacy for queer and trans youth and their friends and family. Rainbow Youth has experienced significant growth over the past few years and has had to increase the number of paid staff as a result. This has meant more focus on finding funding to cover the salaries, compromising the service available for young people. Rainbow Youth runs an intern progamme, offering work experience to youth that can be listed on a CF and cover a wide range of roles. Many queer youth struggle to find work because due to prejudice of employers and this way they are able to get work experience and develop skills under the guidance of staff. Rainbow Youth is also frequently chosen as the place of work for placement students from a range of degrees, including nursing, social work, youth work and art therapy. Mobility is critical to bring the services into communities and into households so that health and settlement services for refugees are actually accessible. Funding will allow Refugees as Survivors to urgently replace their aging fleet of Toyota Prius eco-vehicles that are used for its mobile service as well as purchase a van for transport for the activities of the RYAN Refugee Youth Action Network. RYAN, the Refugee Youth Action Network, aims to connect, support and empower young people from refugee backgrounds across Auckland with a focus on engagement, employment and education.	\$12,995.00

Funding will support salaries of the "Incubator Homes" initiative. The Incubation Programme starts in prison where inmates are assessed against rigid criteria to confirm their readiness for "incubation". Upon release, the participants move to a Hamilton based safestructured housing where the multi-levelled support programme wraps around them to ensure a successful reintegration into society. Funding is sought for their project titled "Practical Purpose Education & Learning" for the delivery of their Certificate in Community Engagement and Employment Skills (CCEES). The course duration is for 20 weeks and covers health and wellbeing, community skills and employment skills. It is designed specifically to address the main barriers and difficulties in gaining employment and financial independence. This course helps to prevent and overcome long-term welfare dependency and empowers women to generate their own income. Silver Fern MotorSport Charitable Trust	Silver Fern MotorSport Charitable Trust provides training, education and mentorship to people, particularly young people who are identified as 'at-risk' or disadvantaged, focusing on the automotive and motorsport-based industries, and to better place them for future employment and for self-development. Funding has been approved for rent costs for the training and mentorship facility in Glen Eden which provides a purpose-built training workshop for practical activities and a teaching room. The purpose of this ongoing service is to ensure that all women can have access to this service at any time of the day or night. Spirt of Adventure Trust	The purpose of Spirit of Adventure Trust is to offer equal opportunity to young New Zealanders to develop qualities of leadership, independence and community spirit through the pathway of the sea. Te Whangai Trust	Te Whakaora Tangata is an innovator of parent-based, Whanau restoration programmes in South Auckland. Approved funding will contribute towards a portion of two salaries for the Emotional Healing (Whanau restoration) programme, the Director and a new Evaluations Manager. Outreach workers employed by UMMA Trust, and previous sufferers of domestic violence, lead targeted individual interventions for women dealing with domestic violence.
